There are six categories with six questions in each category, followed by a Final Jeopardy question. The categories are:

- Pole Dancing
- Where in the World
- Attic Treasures
- The Place to “B”
- Pass the Ham
- Preparing for the Holidays

# Pole Dancing (\$100)

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Penguins inhabit this pole.

# What is south?

Penguins don't live in the Arctic region. They are found outside Antarctica in Australia, New Zealand, along the South Atlantic Ocean coasts in South America, and in South Africa.



# Pole Dancing (\$200)

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This pole does not exist on a solid ice mass. It consists of water and is surrounded by land.

# What is north?

The south pole is the exact opposite. It is a landmass surrounded by water.

# Pole Dancing (\$400)

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This pole has bears.

# What is north?

Polar bears are found only in and around the Arctic Circle.



# Pole Dancing (\$600)

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This admiral is famous for his expeditions to the north and south poles in the 1920s.

# Who is Admiral (Richard) Byrd?

He flew over the north pole in 1926  
and the south pole in 1929.

# Pole Dancing (\$800)

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This is the reason for the ongoing dance among nations to claim ownership of the north pole.

# **What are natural resources (or anything close)?**

The region is home to the world's largest supply of oil and gas resources.

# Pole Dancing (\$1,000)

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The first documented discovery of the north pole was by this explorer.

# Who is Dr. Frederick Cook?

Cook and two assistants reached the north pole on April 21, 1908. Robert Peary was given credit for “discovering” the north pole, but it is likely that Cook had arrived there almost a year before Peary.

# Where in the World (\$100)

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This U.S. city has some  
skyscrapers with their  
own zip codes.

# What is New York City?

It has more than 40 buildings with their own zip codes, and Saks Fifth Avenue's shoe department has its own zip code. It was created in partnership with the USPS in 2007 as part of a marketing strategy.

# Where in the World (\$200)

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This is the capital of Portugal.

# What is Lisbon?

Each year, eight million tourists visit the site of the miracle of Fátima in Portugal, north of Lisbon.



# Where in the World (\$400)

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Before it was called  
Mumbai, this was the  
name of the Indian city.

# **What is Bombay?**

**It was changed when the Shiv Sena party took control of the government.**

# Where in the World (\$600)

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It is one of the two countries  
Mount Everest spans.

# What is Nepal or Tibet?

Mount Everest is the tallest mountain in the world, and it continues growing every year due to a phenomenon known as geological uplift.



# Where in the World (\$800)

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Piccadilly Circus is  
in this capital city.

# What is London?

Circuses are areas in London where many roads intersect at various points in a circle, and it comes from the Latin *circ*, meaning “circle.”

# Where in the World (\$1,000)

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Peru is more than just Machu Picchu. This vibrant city is its capital.

# What is Lima?

The steep cliffs along the Pacific Ocean offer breathtaking views.

# Attic Treasures (\$100)

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These old pieces of paper, the size and shape of diplomas, represent shares owned in a company.

# What are stock certificates?

Chances are the company has long gone out of business, but they are fun to look at and to use as a teaching tool with youngsters. If the company is still in existence, you could be sitting on a fortune.

# Attic Treasures (\$200)

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You might find cardboard tubes around two feet tall with these in them.

# What are posters (or art prints)?

Some artists' prints can sell for a pretty penny. For example, a print of Edward Bawden's 1961 "Liverpool Street Station" sold for £9,200 in 2019.

# Attic Treasures (\$400)

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If you peek into boxes, you might find amber, green, pink, yellow, red, or cobalt blue drinking glasses from the 1920s through the 1940s. They are made of this.

# What is depression glass?

The colorful glass added some cheer during a difficult time.



## **Attic Treasures (\$600)**

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If you look through old purses and stumble upon dimes, quarters, half dollars, and dollars, save them because they are probably made of this.

# What is silver?

Their value is generally based on the amount of silver in the coins, but you might have accidentally stumbled upon some numismatic coins, which bring a hefty premium.

# Attic Treasures (\$800)

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Those dusty, old rugs leaning against the wall might be from the Far East, but they are generically referred to as this.

# What are Oriental rugs?

The ones from Iran are Persian rugs.

# Attic Treasures (\$1,000)

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If you stumble upon a collection of comic books and are lucky enough to find Detective Comics #27, you will find the first appearance of this character.

# What is Batman?

Released in May 1939, the story in which he debuts is titled “The Case of the Chemical Syndicate.” A copy in good condition can be worth over one million dollars.



# The Place to “B” (\$100)

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This is the capital of China.

# What is Beijing?

Formerly known as Peking, it is the second-largest city, with a population of more than 21 million people. The largest city is Shanghai, with around 24 million people.


# The Place to “B” (\$200)

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Victoria is the capital of this Canadian province.

# What is British Columbia?

The city proper has fewer than 100,000 residents. Victoria has the second-oldest Chinatown. Only San Francisco's is older.

# The Place to “B” (\$1,000)

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This strait separates  
Alaska and Russia.

# What is Bering?

The boundary between the United States and Russia lies in the middle of the strait. Only 55 miles separate the two countries at the narrowest point of the waterway.

# Pass the Ham (\$100)

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This is a common pet rodent.

# What is hamster?

**Fun fact:** Hamsters and rats belong to different families, and hamsters are not usually found in the wild.



# Pass the Ham (\$200)

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This is a container for dirty clothes in the U.S. but more of a picnic basket in the U.K.

# What is hamper?

Hampers containing food were introduced to England by France and gained popularity during the Victorian period.

# Pass the Ham (\$400)

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This is a major port city  
in northern Germany.

# What is Hamburg?

Located on the Elbe River, it is the country's largest port and the most populous city in Germany after Berlin.

# Pass the Ham (\$600)

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This and the sickle appeared  
on the Soviet flag.

# What is hammer?

The hammer and sickle were symbols of the USSR's power and represented Soviet communism.

# Pass the Ham (\$800)

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It is either Shakespeare's play  
or a small, sleepy village.

# What is *Hamlet*/hamlet?

You'll find hamlets in the English countryside or in New England.

# Pass the Ham (\$1,000)

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This is a generic name for checkered or plaid fabrics.

# What is gingham?

Dorothy wears a  
blue gingham dress  
in *The Wizard of Oz*.
